## Chiller Replacement Project Successfully Funded

*Donations Ensure that Residents Can Chill this Summer*

The generosity of our friends and benefactors has come shining through once again, providing us with the funds necessary to replace our 300-ton air conditioning unit. The “chiller” failed last summer. Our smaller chiller and a rented unit came to the rescue, but these small units failed in October.

The “chiller project” was initiated at Christmas, when Mother Margaret Regina made a special appeal to raise the approximately \$700,000 needed for new equipment and for rentals in the interim. “In the past, many of you have given us a donation at this time of the year, so may I ask you a special favor?” Mother inquired.

She announced that there was a generous benefactor offering a matching gift of up to \$300,000 if the remaining amount could be raised in 2023. “If you can donate to this project or could double your amount this year to meet this campaign deadline, we would be most grateful!” Mother said.

The last of the necessary funding was secured by the end of December, when long-time donor B. F. Saul made a generous donation to ensure that we

would receive the matching funds, which were offered by another long-time friend and supporter of our Home, Genevieve Murphy.

In March, we were so happy to see the removal of the old chiller and the delivery of the new one! “Thanks to the support of our friends, we can overcome the unexpected failure of our AC equipment,” said Sr. Joseph. “Thankfully, this means a cool Home for the Residents and Sisters, as we expect the new equipment to be operational before summer and its soaring temps.”

The installation of the Trane chiller represents a step towards a more sustainable and energy-efficient future

for our Home. As we look ahead, this improvement will lead to reduced energy consumption, furthering our efforts to decarbonize our Home and meet the District’s greenhouse gas goals. Additionally, it will result in significant cost savings and qualify us for potential incentives from the DC Sustainable Energy Utility, maximizing the impact of your contributions.

“There are still significant costs to completely restore our AC system – we must also replace the air handling units and the small chiller,” said Sr. Joseph, who is helping to oversee the project. “But now, we are on our way!”

Your donations significantly contribute to the Residents’ well-being and comfort, assuring that we can continue to provide them with the care and dignity they deserve. We extend our deepest gratitude to all our supporters, knowing that together we are making a meaningful and lasting difference in the lives of the elderly.

Dionne Jackson attended as National Youth Poet Laureate Amanda Gorman, who gained international fame when she read her poem at the inauguration of President Joe Biden. Ramona Hatten read Ms. Gorman's moving poem entitled "The Hill We Climb." Shellyann Kelly came as Maya Angelou, while Eunice Ferrell attended as renowned gospel singer Mahalia Jackson.

Elaine Barber, garbed in an outfit resembling Dorothy Height's, complete with her signature hat, spoke about Height's significant role as the first leader in the civil rights movement to recognize inequality for women and African Americans as problems that should be considered in tandem. She focused on the issues of unemployment, illiteracy, and voter awareness.

Pope Francis declared her venerable on June 22, 2023.

During the program, volunteers entertained us with gospel music, which had the Residents clapping and singing along. "This was a beautiful program. Everyone really enjoyed it!" said Resident Fr. Richard Hite.

### World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly

**July 28**

Pope Francis has chosen a line from Psalm 71 – "Do not cast me off in my old age" – as the theme for the 2024 celebration of the World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly.

The Vatican said in a statement, "This choice is meant to call attention to the fact that, sadly, loneliness is the bitter lot in life of many elderly persons, so often the victims of the throwaway culture."

In a companion statement, Cardinal Kevin J. Farrell, prefect of the Dicastery for Laity, the Family and Life said, "Families and parishes are called to be at the forefront in promoting a culture of encounter, to create spaces for sharing, listening, to offer support and affection: thus, the love of the Gospel becomes concrete. Our communities, with their tenderness and affectionate attention that does not forget its most fragile members, are called to manifest the love of God, who never abandons anyone."

By cherishing the charisms of grandparents and the elderly, and the contribution they make to the life of the Church, the World Day seeks to support the efforts of every ecclesial community to forge bonds between the generations and to combat loneliness.

Celebrated for the first time in 2021, Pope Francis decreed that the World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly be observed each year on the Sunday closest to the Feast of Saints Joachim and Anne, Jesus' grandparents.
